Council Recommends Change.

At a special meeting held on Wednesday morning, Town Council passed the following resolution:

"Whereas, 'Daylight Saving Time' has been adopted by the cities of Philadelphia, Camden, Atlantic City, and other neighboring municipalities: Therefore be it

Resolved, by the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of Hammonton, that the observance of 'Daylight Saving Time' be and hereby is recommended to the residents of the Town of Hammonton."

A letter was received from the Kiwanis Club, urging the adoption of daylight saving time.

Jas. W. Cottrell, for the American Legion, invited Council to meet National Commander Hunsford Macsieder, on Friday noon, at Civic Club Hall. This was accepted.

Further complaints were received of the dumping of loose, burnable rubbish at the gravel pit. Agreed, that the place be cleaned up, and restrictions enforced.

The Atlantic County May Day Fete and Musical Contest will take place on the Athletic field of the public schools of Hammonton, on Saturday, May 13th. The exercises will open at nine o'clock with a parade of all students of the schools of the county that participate in the events, led by the Hammonton Band. Immediately after the parade, a mass exhibition drill will be given on the athletic field. At ten-thirty o'clock, in the First M. E. Church, the singing contest will take place. There are six schools taking part in this event.

At one o'clock, on the athletic field, the physical training contest will take place, in which at least six schools will participate. Following this, the regular field and track events will take place. There are eighteen of these events in which boys and girls from all parts of the county enter.

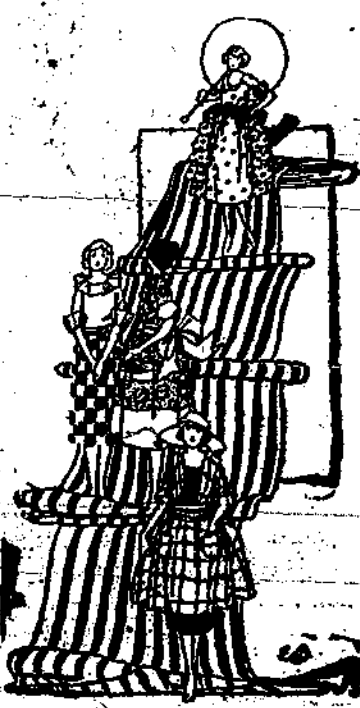
