Town Council.

Council held its regular meeting on Wednesday evening, with all chairs filled but that of Mr. Jackson. Law and Order Committee reported list of arrests, and several cases of run-away boys, which were returned to their homes.

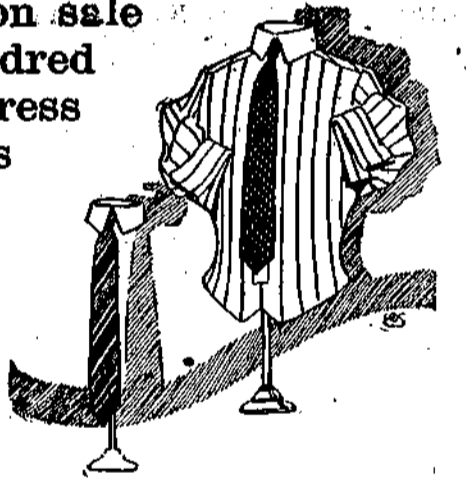

From here he went to North Carolina to accept the position of assistant manager of the Broad Acre Ranch. Enlisting in the navy in 1918, Mr. Eldred spent a year overseas as a sub-chaser on in the Mediterranean. Since then he has held a responsible position with the Seabrook Farms, at Bridgeton, and while there has had an opportunity to become acquainted with South Jersey conditions which will be of help to him in tackling the problems of Atlantic County's agriculture. A. H. Saxe, who has been acting County Agent since the resignation of A. E. Wilkinson several months ago, will continue temporarily as Assistant County Agent, and with such a team Atlantic County's agricultural prospects look very bright.

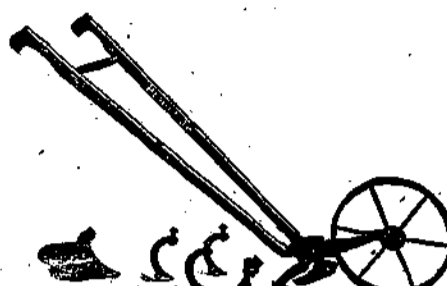

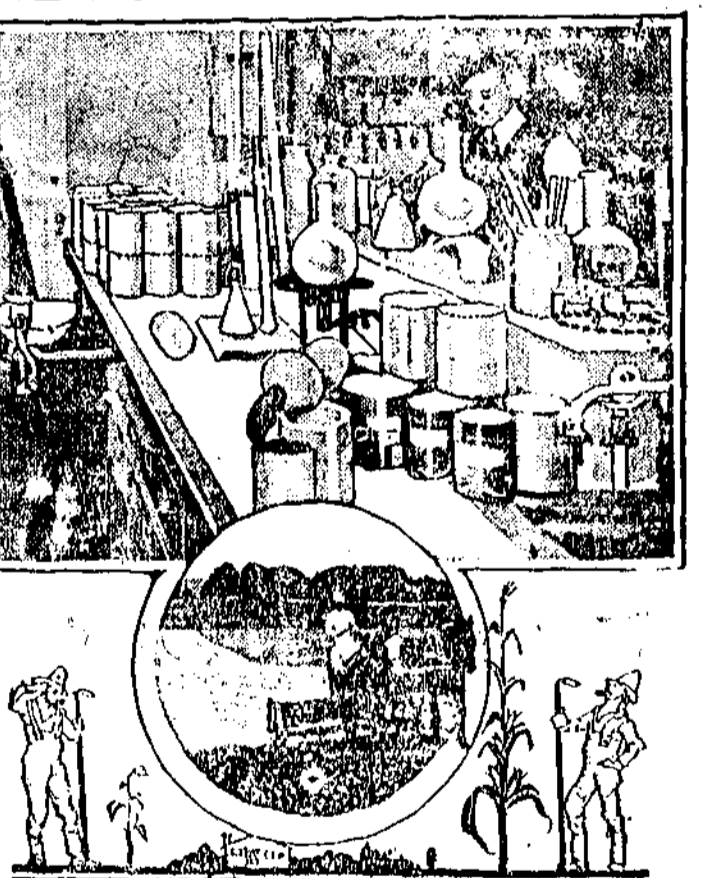
