A very lively discussion ensued with Mr. O'Donnell taking the stand that such a subject was not within the jurisdiction of Council and it should be taken up, if at all, with the Board of Education. Finally Council went into executive session and no action was taken in the regular session.

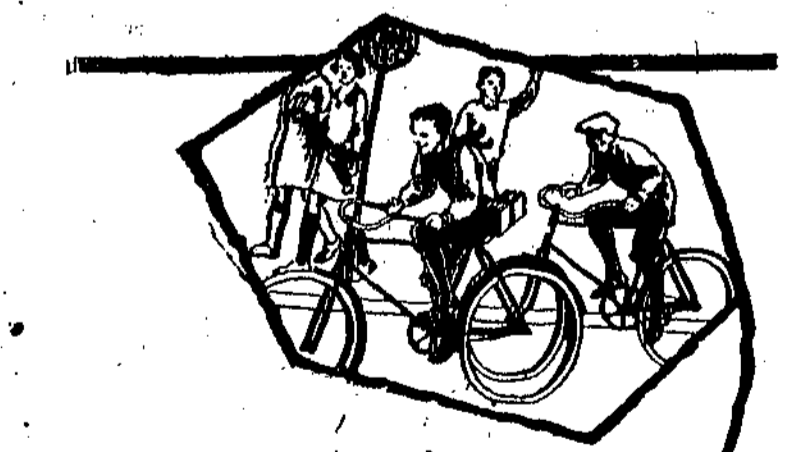

Atlantic City To Have Scientific Market Plan

Planning to simplify the buying of perishable food products required by its innumerable hotels and boarding houses, as well as by its large resident population, Atlantic City will bring into effect a marketing system under the direction of a city market director. The new plan is expected to eliminate much of farm products and expensive distribution and one of its important functions will be to keep producers and buyers more closely informed as to supply and demand.

The Atlantic City authorities, at the suggestion of the County Board of Agriculture, have planned for a commission of seven members to direct the market project. The commission will have complete authority over all marketing activities of the city. Its personnel will include two hotel men, two farmers, one wholesaler, one retailer and one representative of consumers. The City market director will work under their supervision.

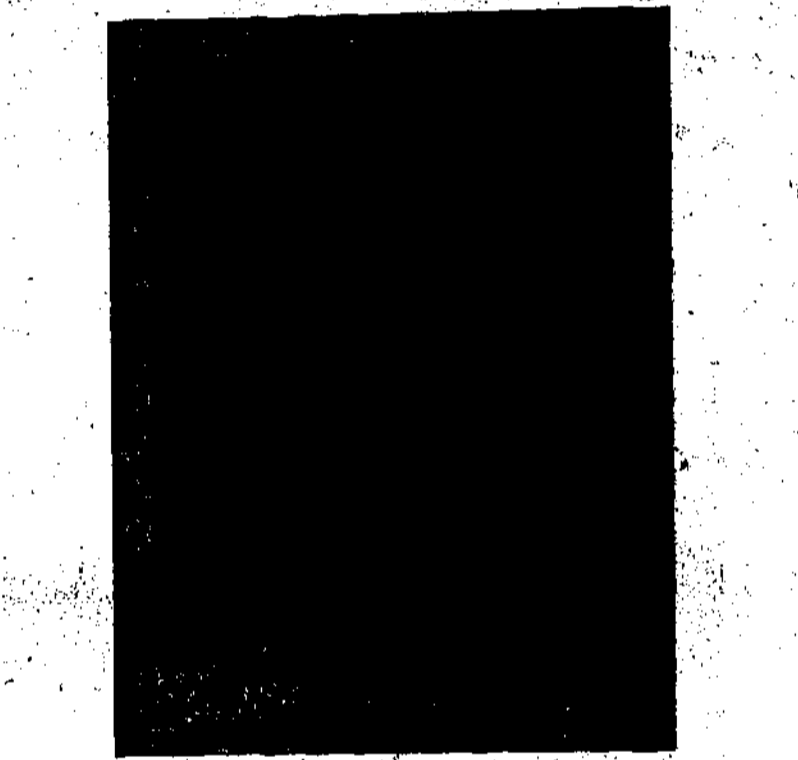

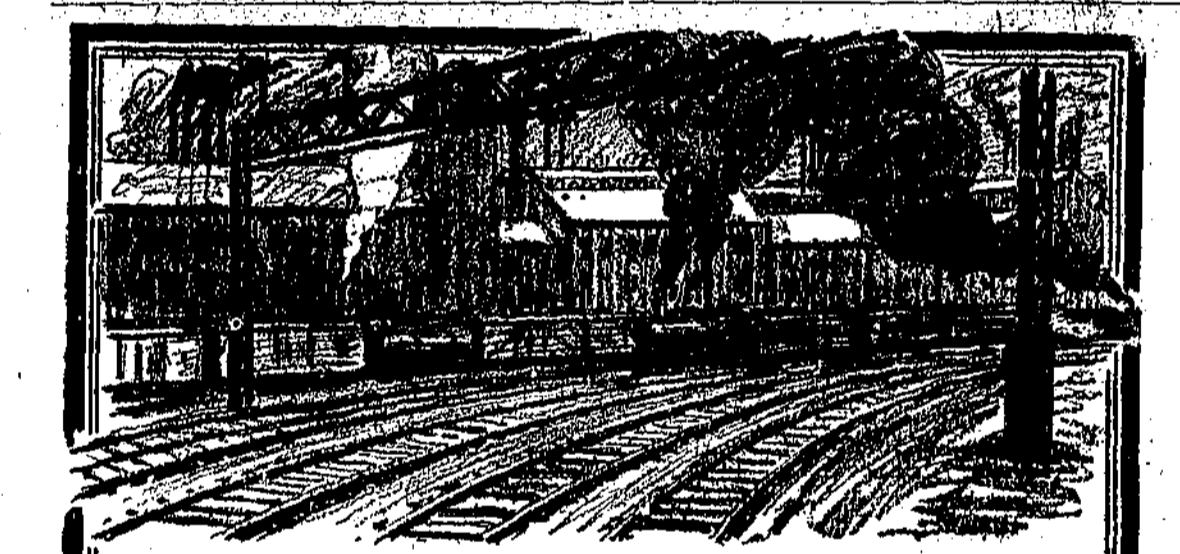

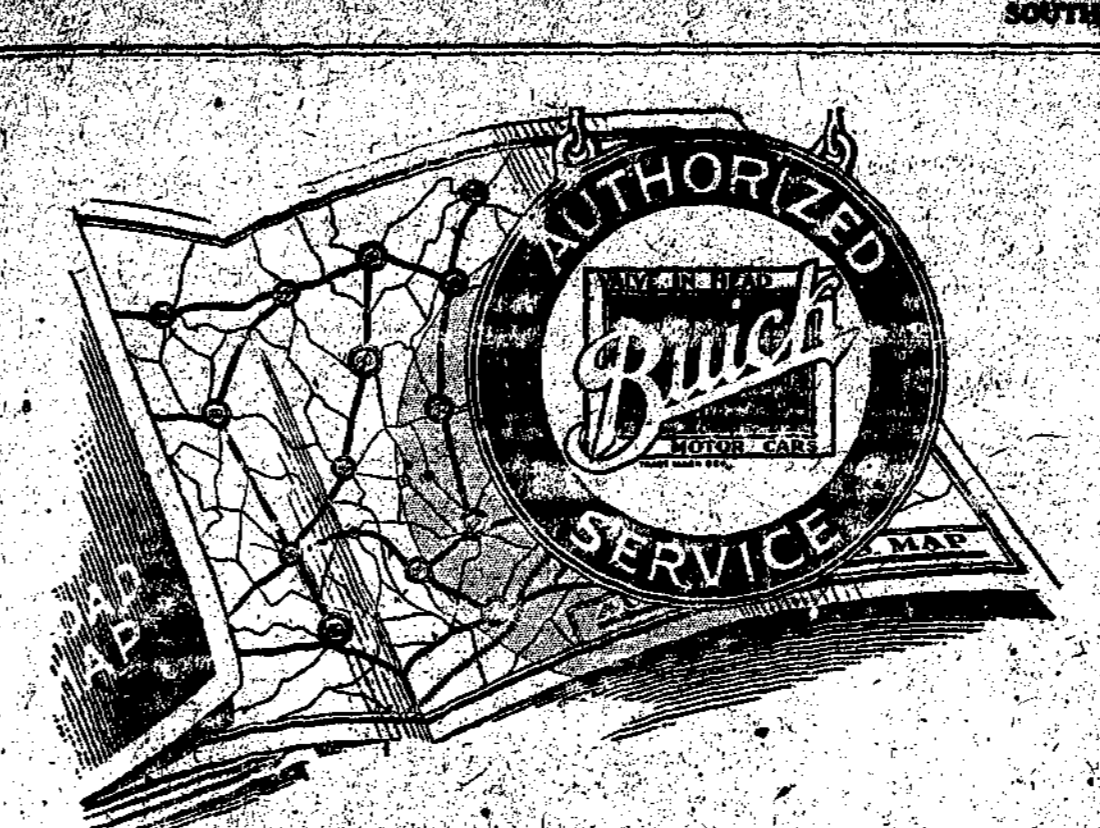

The "South Jersey Republican," Gentlemen:

In your next issue, with your permission, I will tell your readers why I retired from the local newspaper business, feeling, as I did that when you men who had responded to the call of duty during the World War period essayed the task of publishing a weekly newspaper in Hammonton that your combined efforts could do more for the community than mine.

I feel that you will be able to do a great work here, and wish you the best of success. It costs money, a deal of it, and much work, to produce a newspaper, and you should have the earnest support of every right thinking man and woman in the community. Preliminary to the exposition of facts which I shall make in my next letter kindly print the following appeal to "build well" for the future. Let Hammonton ape not the cities, where evil is ever rampant, where hosts of souls go down to degradation, and where nations are ruined. Truly it has been said "God made the country, man made the town." The hope of the world is in America, and the hope of America is not in its great cities, but in the "towns", as in distinction with "the cities."

It is in the people who plow, sow and reap on our farms, in the people who live in our villages, the small towns, and those cities not patterned after New York, Philadelphia and Chicago. Men, hundreds of thousands of them, desert the big cities, and the smaller ones which follow in the foot steps of those mentioned above — to bring their loved ones into communities where a livelihood may be obtained — oftentimes the remuneration is a mere fraction of what could be earned in the forsaken community — that their children might be brought up under influences that would send them out into the world good, strong, American Christian men and women.

When they have reached that stage of life — and not until then — are they able to enter the vortex of life as it is today in hundreds of towns and cities, and live somewhere close to the life God intended they should live. Therefore, when certain conditions confront us every man and woman who has at heart the welfare of town, county, state and nation should do his or her part to rectify evil conditions existing in the community in which he or she resides. Do it because it is a DUTY to our fellow man, to our great Republic,

a form of government which has made us the greatest nation on the face of the earth, but which cannot long endure unless Justice is accorded all. You have heard the statements of Washington, of Lincoln, of Woodrow Wilson, of President Harding on this subject. And Justice cannot be had without law observance and law enforcement. The first voluntarily on the part of good citizens, the second by impartial, courageous officials, men, who without fear or favor, will enforce the laws of the state and nation.

Read and study these words, from the pen of Col. Guy R. Goff, Assistant Attorney General of the United States:

"To have good government, we must have good citizens — and always continuously, a warfare without truce or quarter against those who violate the law. If the laws are ignored there is no government at all. Self righteousness is a real American peril. There are those who, because of political honor or personal friendship, or perhaps stronger influences, will allow illegal practices to be perpetuated, and the law to be not at naught."

Truer words were never spoken by an American soldier. They directly affect Hammonton and Atlantic Co. Ofttimes, in order to compel reluctant officials to perform the tasks for which they were chosen it becomes necessary to arouse public opinion. The newspaper man who does his duty in this respect, with malice to none, and having in view justice to all, is one of the most valuable members of the community, and deserving both the moral and financial support of all right thinking men and women in his community. Without his aid comparatively few would be in a position to know conditions actually existing.
