Strawberry Festival.

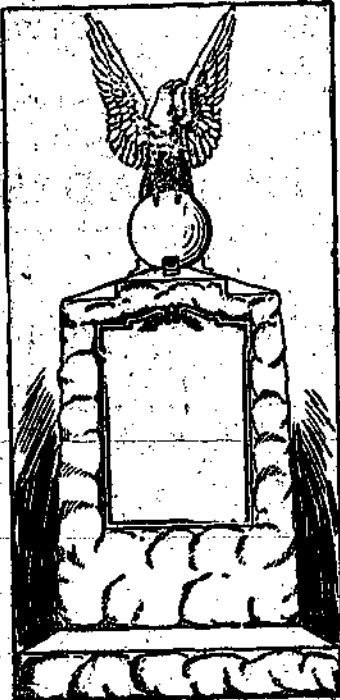
