Wind Caused by the Sun

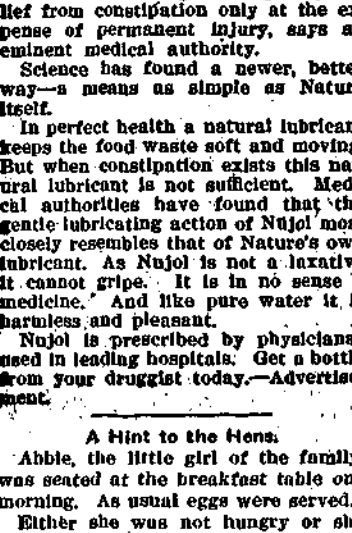

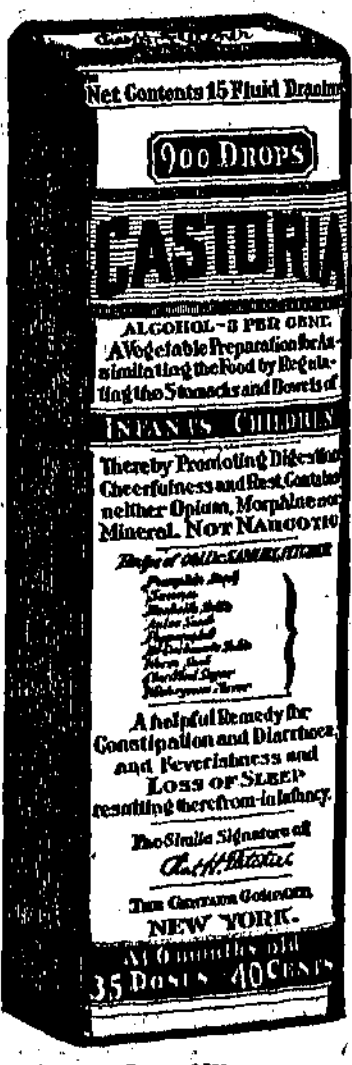

EDITORIAL COMMENT

DISCUSSION OF PUBLIC ISSUES

There has been, in Hammonton, lately considerably more discussion of legislation, public questions and issues, and government generally than has been the case for some time.

We are glad that we have the opportunity to bring many questions to the attention of the public through our columns.

DECISION: COUNCIL'S POWER AND DUTY

KEEPS GIRL TWO YEARS IN SHED

Father, Found Guilty of Extreme Cruelty, Declares She Would Not Behave.

INSANITY IS RESULT

Long Confinement Nearly Deprives the Young Woman of Sight and Speech—Causes Big Sensation in Community.

Bucyrus, Ohio.—Jacob P. Menges, charged with keeping his twenty-six-year-old daughter, Irene, in a dingy smokehouse for two years because she "wouldn't behave," has been found guilty of excessive cruelty by a jury in Judge Rummels' court.

The case grew out of the fact that on May 8, Sheriff Edward J. Knappenberger went to the Menges home, midway between Gation and Crestline, and found the girl, partly nude, in a smokehouse near the barn.

Irene was brought to Bucyrus, where she was cared for by Mrs. Knappenberger, wife of the sheriff. She was reported to show signs of long neglect.

Chester A. Meek, Crawford county prosecutor, states that the case is brought under state law, making the finding of the justice court final.

Under the care of the sheriff's wife she brightened noticeably, but showed little response to attempts to induce her to explain her captivity in the shed.

State records obtained by authorities here revealed that Irene had been confined in the Toledo institution in 1914, but released as being mentally competent June 30, 1915.

At the trial of Menges his wife denied testimony of Mrs. Knappenberger as to the condition of Irene at the time of her arrival at the jail.

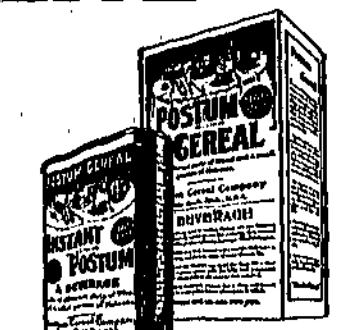

The Size of China. China is larger in area than the United States, Mexico and Central America. To Make Glass Flat. It is supposed to be difficult to blow glass. Here is a simple method: Make a slip match by using a slip on edge of piece of glass. Heat a small iron (about the size of a four-leaf clover) until red hot, and apply the end of the slip to the surface of glass. As the heated slip is applied, a crack will appear in direction of iron.

Stamps That Stick. To separate stamps that have stuck together, lay a thin piece of paper over them and run a hot iron along it. The stamps will come apart easily and the paper will remain.
