Town Council.

Council held a very busy session on Wednesday morning, and adjourned about one o'clock with business still on the docket to do next Thursday evening, at an adjourned meeting.

Highway Committee reported estimate received for retaining wall for sidewalk near Park; also that railroad had offered cinders for path. They also stated that sag in gutter at Fire house would be repaired.

Finance Committee reported the inuring of members of the Police Department.

Property Committee called attention to the new concrete steps at hall entrance.

Fire Chief reported a busy month; also submitted list of members eligible to tax exemption.

Frank Oulife's request for permission to place five hundred gallon gasoline tank under walk, between railroads, was referred to Committee.

Chas. Hall was granted permission to move his pool room off Bellevue to Twelfth Street.

Fallias Society asked for the usual privileges, parade, lighting, and fireworks display, on July 15th and 17th (Sunday intervening). Privilege granted, with usual bond.

F. A. Funston Post was given permission to conduct July 4th celebration at Park.

The Mayor was authorized to issue a proclamation, calling on people to assist the Legion at the Park today, taking cakes, axes, grub boxes, lunches, etc.

The cost of the band on the 4th was estimated by the town's committee. The privilege of the Park,—baseball diamond, etc., were left with the Park Committee and Legion Committee.

Treasurer reported paying off \$350.00 on tax—state notes. The two ordinances pertaining to new water supply equipment were passed last reading.

The paving ordinance hearing was held, and passed third reading and adopted.

Clerk reported his receipts for licenses, etc., the sum of \$57.40. Collector Detwaine's receipts for taxes for month \$16,737.23. Engineer was authorized to proceed with preparation of specifications and advertising for steel

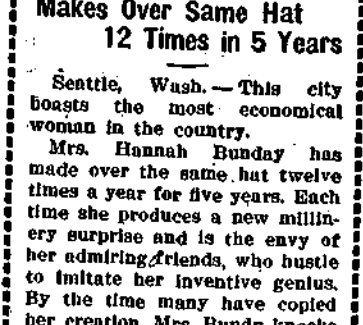
