The application must be made to the Secretary upon said application, whether for either or both of said sets of blue prints and the pamphlet, - \$25.00 of this sum will be remitted to the bidder upon return, to the Board, within thirty days after the opening of said bids, of the pamphlet and blue prints covering the construction of the pipe line or the disposal plant; if both pamphlets and both sets of blue prints are returned to the Board within said time, a remittance of \$15.00 will be made. In any case in which a person, firm or corporation, receiving any one or all of said pamphlets and blue prints, shall fail to return all received, said payment of \$25.00 will be retained by the Board as the price of the pamphlets or blue prints not returned.






