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AN ORDINANCE

An Ordinance providing for the extension of the sanitary sewer from Cottage Avenue to Third Street from Cottage Avenue to Third Street, and along Fairview Avenue, thence along Fairview Avenue, in a northeasterly direction, in the City of Hammonton, Atlantic County, New Jersey, and providing that such extension shall be undertaken as an improvement with assessment of benefits.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Council of Hammonton in Council assembled, that the sanitary sewer shall be extended under and along Third Street, in a northeasterly direction from its present termination on Third Street at Cottage Avenue to Fairview Avenue, thence under and along Fairview Avenue, in a northeasterly direction to a point about 260 feet from the center of Third Street, in accordance with the plan approved by Town Council.

Section 2. And be it ordained that the extension of said sewer as aforesaid shall be undertaken as a local improvement.

Section 3. And be it further ordained that the cost of such extension of said sewer shall be paid for in the first instance by the issuance of temporary improvement notes which shall mature in not exceeding one year from their date, and shall bear interest at not exceeding six per centum per annum, and which said notes may from time to time be renewed by the issuance of new notes of such maturity and rate of interest as the Town Council in its wisdom may determine.

Section 4. And be it further ordained that upon the completion of the work of extending said sewer there shall be assessed upon such land or real estate as may be benefited by said improvement such portion of expenses as will equal the amount of benefits actually acquired by such land or real estate in the manner as now provided by law. Said assessment of benefits shall be used for the payment or retirement of the temporary improvement notes which may be issued as hereinbefore provided.

Section 5. And be it further ordained that this ordinance shall take effect immediately.

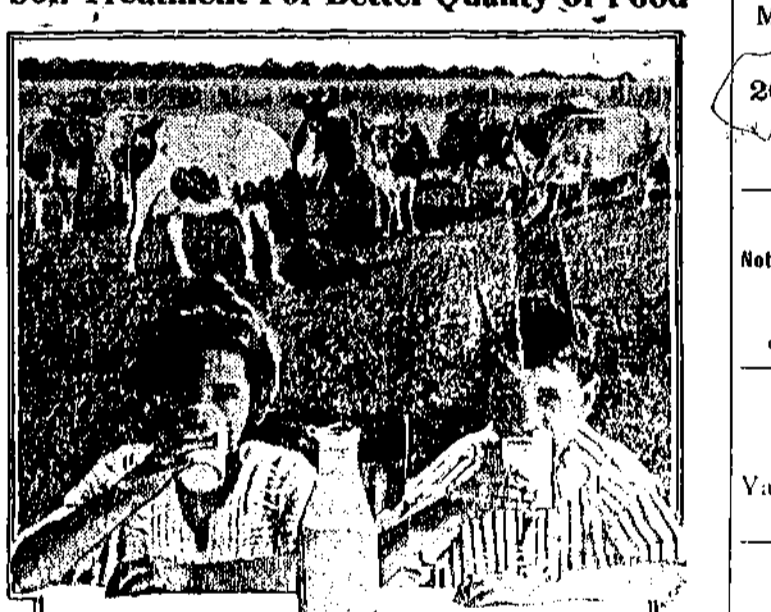
