**School Meeting Notes.**

As mentioned in the Republican 'Judge' last Saturday, the voters adopted the Board's first proposition, to add four rooms to the rear of the High School, and rejected the new High School proposition. The subject was thoroughly discussed on all sides, most of those opposed to the plan seeming to feel that it was an inopportune time to incur such a debt; also, that it should not be erected on other than a prominent street.

It was expected that the counting of the ballots would not be completed until the early morning hours; but instead, the result was announced at 10:30. The vote: For proposition one, 105; against, 24.

For proposition two, 51; against, 69.

The voters expressed the wish that a meeting be called for general discussion of the new building idea, which will be completed within

**Visiting Nurse.**

There is being planned, among one or two, the placing of a visiting nurse in Hammonton. While a person in this work will be valuable to us, it seems the general public are kept completely in the dark. The nurse will be paid partly by the Metropolitan Insurance Co., the County Board of Freeholders, and partly by Red Cross funds. As there has not been any public meeting called, for many months, of those who are interested in Red Cross and its philanthropic workings and no one voted to hold various offices in local Red Cross, but are self appointed, continuing their offices since last meeting held in 1919.

It seems a very fitting time for the acting secretary to call a public meeting; have Mrs. E. G. Shreve, Co. Chairman for visiting nurses, to address this meeting, find out the sentiment concerning placing of a nurse and explain our obligation to her. A car will be needed, and pleasant living quarters, where an office for receiving applicants for medical care.

The membership, \$1.00, of which 50c is retained in local Red Cross branches will be used. There will be necessary secretary expenses and a goodly sum in treasurer's hands now. This being given by our people for Red Cross work, they, the public, should have a voice in its expenditures here. A small Executive Committee, say 5, composed of women who are willing to give their time and pay their own expenses. Then an Auxiliary composed, say of a County Committee member as Chairman, and any woman who will work, sew, visit or cook, to keep the Nurse supplied with all necessary equipment.

Working in the open, in all public work brings its lasting good results, and as such I will publicly ask Miss Conkey, acting Secretary of Red Cross, to arrange a public meeting for us and have prepared explanations of Visiting Nurse. A prospective nurse, Miss Ziegler, arrived in Hammonton last week, missed meeting Mrs. Shreve here, so talked over the situation here with Mrs. Sam'l Anderson and Mrs. Chas. Cunningham. She is available for the position about the middle of September.

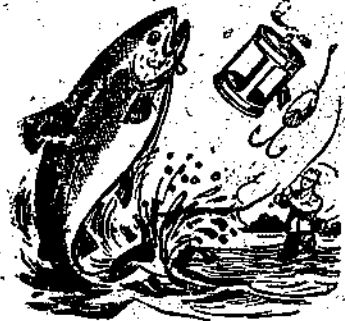

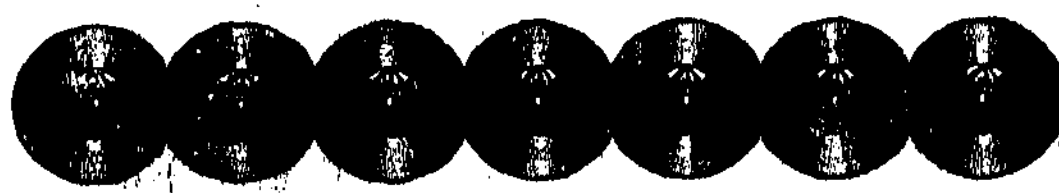
