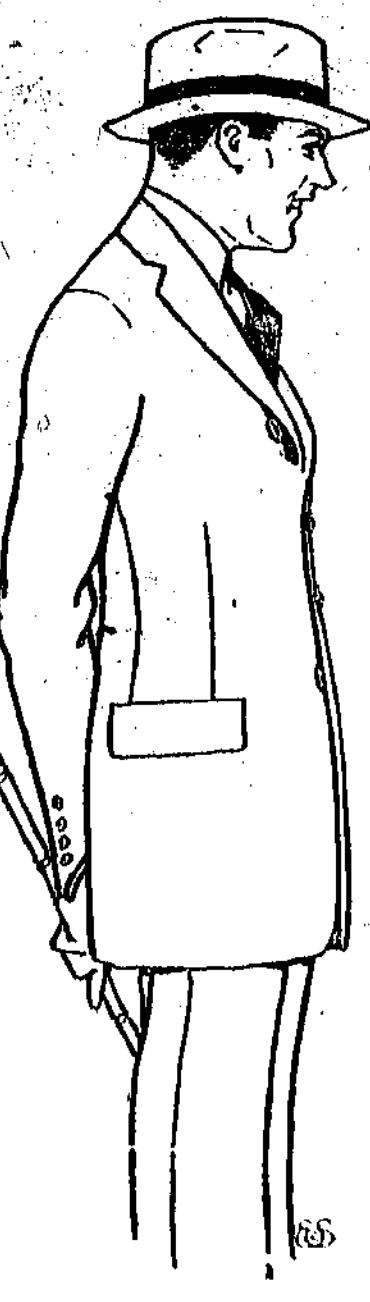

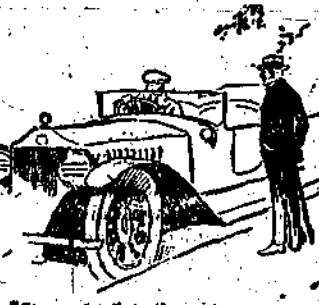

SEE RECORD CROP

Western Canada Farmers Rejoice Over Bountiful Harvest.

Favorable weather and fertile land combine to produce rich crops in the hands of agriculturists.

There are those to be envied every day in the United States who have relatives or friends, or someone they have known, who are residents of some of the provinces of Western Canada. They have good things to say about the progress and occupation of farmers.

Their progress has been carefully watched and such news as they come from them or the country that they have taken partial possession of will be read with interest. Important news just now is the condition of the crops. Newspaper correspondents and government representatives are now in the field, after making a careful survey of conditions, to announce that the crop conditions in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta carry the promise of an early and bountiful harvest and farmers view the outlook with utmost pleasure.

Good growing weather has prevailed since seeding and all cereals are well advanced. Wheat headed out has long, heavy heads, and harvesting has begun in some sections in the early part of August. An interesting feature of the situation is the fact that there are no bad reports from any part of the country from the Red river to the Rocky mountains and from the International boundary to the coast. There will also be good fruit, vegetable and root crops.

Most remarkable has been the germination of most of the grain. Marquis wheat sown on May 11 was fully headed out on June 30.

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CHICAGO WOMAN STOLEN BY FIJIS

Rescued by Posse Headed by Her Husband After Exciting Experience on Island.

San Francisco—Kidnaped for months, carried into a sandalwood forest in the mountainous region of one of the Fiji islands and rescued by a posse headed by her husband was the thrilling experience related by Mrs. Julia Whitley of Chicago on her arrival on the steamer Tahiti.

"One beautiful evening I was walking in the garden of our hotel at Suva when eight natives accosted me," Mrs. Whitley said.

"I placed a handkerchief in my mouth while the others tied by hands and feet. They then carried me out into the back country."

"Several attendants of the hotel saw the abduction and notified me," Mrs. Whitley immediately organized a posse and gave chase. For over an hour she followed the trail of her captors until they came upon a hut where I was being held hostage.

"The bandits planned to hold me prisoner until my husband paid a ransom. I overheard them discuss their design. I was threatened with death should I refuse to pay the ransom. I was placed over me until dawn, while the night passed uneventfully."

We have a copy of the New Jersey constitution for 1921, which our readers are welcome to consult. Of course, we cannot let them go out of the office, as we have to refer to them often.

As will be seen by their notice, the Board of Education have called a public meeting of citizens to thoroughly discuss the school building subject. We hope that we shall have as an intelligent lot of people present on the 16th as at the former meeting. Let this subject of a new high school building be understood by everyone, and then put it to a vote. Even the hens are striking for more pay. Eggs have gone back to sixty cents and above.

All Hammonton mourns the death of the little boy by accident, near the dam last Saturday evening. This and other accidents, due to the shortsightedness of the road builders, is causing a sense of dread to come over all those who are not speed mad. Why this end of the road had to be so narrow we do not know—we can only imagine. The writer took a little spin on his bike (in the absence of A. Ford), Saturday, and in another part of the state, found roads wide enough for three machines to pass abreast, and some Atlantic County's end looks too much like "penny wise and pound foolish."

Now that the war is over, people feel that it is coming time to eliminate some of the extra taxes placed on luxuries and necessities of life. Evidently the tax on huge salaries is being removed, for they are thinking up other ways to take its place. Among the newest proposed nuisance are stamps on checks, and a three-cent postnote. They probably know down in Washington what they are about; but we do protest against buying a stamp every time we wiggle a finger. Vacations are now on the map. By the way, it will cost you no thing to have the Republican follow you on your trip.

Our attention has been called to the utter lack of respect that some autoists show for the peace and quiet of our churches on Sundays. They think nothing of parking or practicing their machines in front of or near the houses of worship, opening their mufflers and typing out their horns. It is an offense that no considerable number would be guilty of, and they would be penalized if the congregations cared to push the case. Enforcement is everywhere made in the vicinity of schools and hospitals; and we can see no reason why churches should not be protected against the various forms of racket.

Very many of our people are eagerly looking forward to the Swarthmore Chautauque, which comes to town on the fifth of September, for five days. We shall, each week, publish some feature of the program; and literature can be seen in store windows. This being the tenth Chautauque year, Hammonton will be favored by a visit from the founder, of Chautauque, Dr. Pierpont, during their stay here. It is to the interest of our City Fathers that they stop the contractors from using the Park race track, on which the town has spent much money, as a turntable and parking ground for their heavy trucks. It will be next to impossible to put the track back into shape again, if they are allowed to wallow in the gravel much more. There is plenty of useless ground on the outside of the road. At least a dozen houses are going up, and more to come. Thomas Skinner is erecting one on Second Street, Kirk Spear on Bellevue, Rev. F. J. Cochran on East Packard Street, A. J. Rider on West Packard Street, E. A. Burdick on Orchard Street, and a warehouse is going up on the Stock-well property, on Third Street.

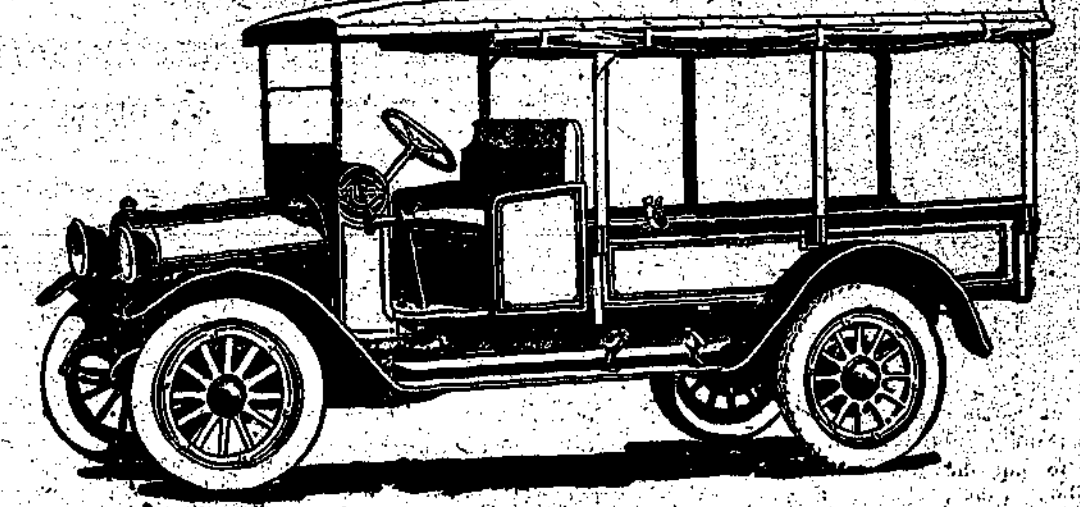
