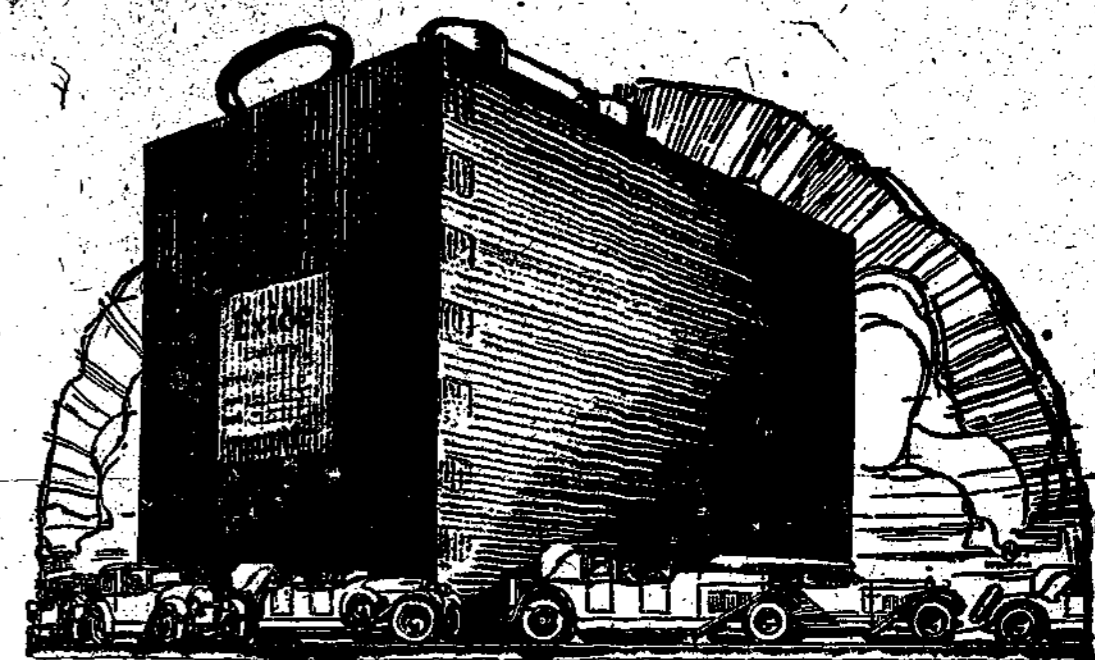

Highway Committee will double the existing capacity of Fourth Street, thus relieving flooded district during storms.
