### CHAUTAQUA.

The sale of season tickets for Chautauqua must close on Monday, August 28, at 3.00 p.m. as no season tickets are sold after Chautauqua begins, as this is our agreement.  
All those who are to purchase season tickets however may obtain them at the Chautauqua booth on the main street on Saturday. The tickets are selling fairly well, even at the increased price, but many more must be sold to cover the contract and the expenses of hauling, printing, lighting, etc.  
Any impression held by anyone that the guarantors make any money from the sale of tickets is a grievous mistake, as the price is fixed by Swarthmore Chautauqua, and all money to the last cent, even to overcosts, go to Chautauqua. This should be understood for all time, and has been explained in previous years.  
If Hammonton is to have a Chautauqua, and makes a contract for the same, then a Chautauqua should be supported as in so doing it makes its support a necessity and takes it out of the class of a luxury, although it is a luxury to have Chautauqua. The payment of the debt then becomes a necessity the same as any other bill of town expense.  
We should then regard the matter in that light, and while the guarantors have to pay the deficit in the guarantee if there is a deficit, the citizens of our town have their part to perform in coming forward and buying season tickets to make sure there will be no deficit. Three dollars may seem considerable, but considering the fact that it is only thirty cents for each entertainment the buyer is receiving more than the value of the money.  
Why not put this across again? Hammonton is not in the habit of taking a back seat behind any town of its size on anything. Let us begin Chautauqua with the money for it in the bank.

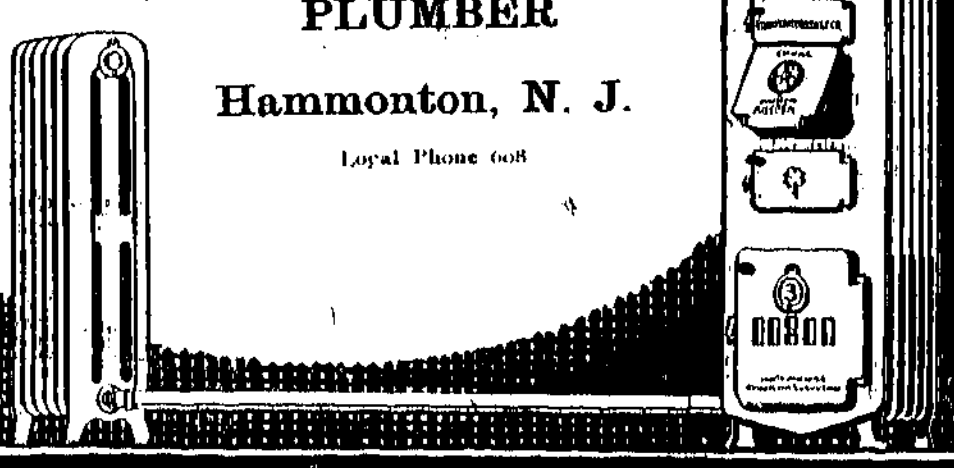
