Valued Citizen Passes Away.

It came as a blow, such as we have rarely known in Hammonton, when, at noon last Saturday, the announcement was made that Dr. Frederick C. Burt had passed away, after but a few days of illness, from pneumonia, aged fifty one years.

Dr. Burt had entered into everything for the betterment of his town, county and state, having been mayor, was chosen freeholder and president of the Board of Education at the time of his death, and was largely instrumental in the installation of the sewerage plant, cement sidewalks, paved streets, etc. He was thoroughly posted on so many subjects that his opinion and push were relied upon.

Dr. Burt came here in 1903, suffering from asthma, but this climate had a decidedly beneficial effect on him.

But few men will be missed as will the Dr., by patients and townspeople as well.

The funeral, on Tuesday, was the largest ever seen in town, there being over one hundred and twenty-five automobiles in line, and the floral offerings the finest and largest ever seen here.

The services were in charge of his pastor, Rev. E. A. Rook, assisted by Rev. W. J. Cusworth, a former pastor, and Rev. Chas. O. Mudge, of the Presbyterian Church.

The large attendance and floral pieces were but mere expressions of the love his townspeople had for him.

The Masonic services at the grave were very impressive.

The Sons of Columbus showed their regard by attending in a body. The Kiwanis Club also turned out, after a noon-day memorial service with remarks by his fellow members, Samuel Anderson, Rev. Chas. O. Mudge, W. R. Soely, and others.

To Mrs. Burt, to Edward, his son, and Miss Ethel, the daughter, our heartiest sympathy is extended.

And Further Be It Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be engrossed for the family of Dr. Burt, also that copies be given to the Press.

And Further, that the Mayor be authorized to sign and the Town Clerk attest said resolutions.
