Town Council.

Town Council held its adjourned meeting on Wednesday evening, with Messrs. O'Donnell, White, and Brownlee, and Mayor Rivins, present.

Finance Committee reported check received from Contractors Sutton & Corson, for \$100, for damage done at the Park.

Sewerage Committee was authorized to dispose of sludge at the plant.

Same Committee was authorized to proceed with sewer extensions.

Clerk reported receiving \$49.40 for licenses, etc.

Fire Chief reported six fires during August, four of which were auto fires.

Letter was read from Joseph Thompson, of the State Dept, after he had inspected the town lockup. He declared it to be unsanitary, unfit for prisoners, ill-ventilated, a fire trap, and hoped officials will remedy same, especially as this is headquarters for State Constabulary.

Samuel Orault asked for transfer of pool-room license from Wm. Tell to himself, as he wished to move his table back into Tell's concrete building.

Three ordinances were introduced and passed first reading:

Authorizing water extension on Washington Street; ordinance regulating the dumping of rubbish; ordinance creating office of Deputy Town Clerk, and fixing duties and salary—\$900.

P. Anthony Colagrosso was elected Cloture Freeholder, to fill the unexpired term of the late Dr. Burt.

H. Link McIntyre was appointed inspector on the concrete road work, at \$4 per day of eight hours.

Death of Dr. F. C. Birt Shock to Entire County.

Only Few Days—Leading Member of Freeholder Board.
Dr. Frederick C. Birt, for many years practicing physician of Hammonton, and one of the representatives of the county on the Board of Chosen Freeholders, died last Saturday after a few days illness, of pneumonia. The illness of the doctor was a great shock to everyone, for he was known in all parts of the county and few were aware of his illness. Dr. Birt was one of the leading members of the county and few men were ever held membership in that body more so than he. He was a general respect and admiration among fellow members. He was chairman of the Asylum Board, a member of the Finance Commission and took a keen interest in the general work of the Board in all departments, leading wise counsel and sound judgment and fearlessly at all times for whatever course of action he deemed it and for the best interest of the public.
