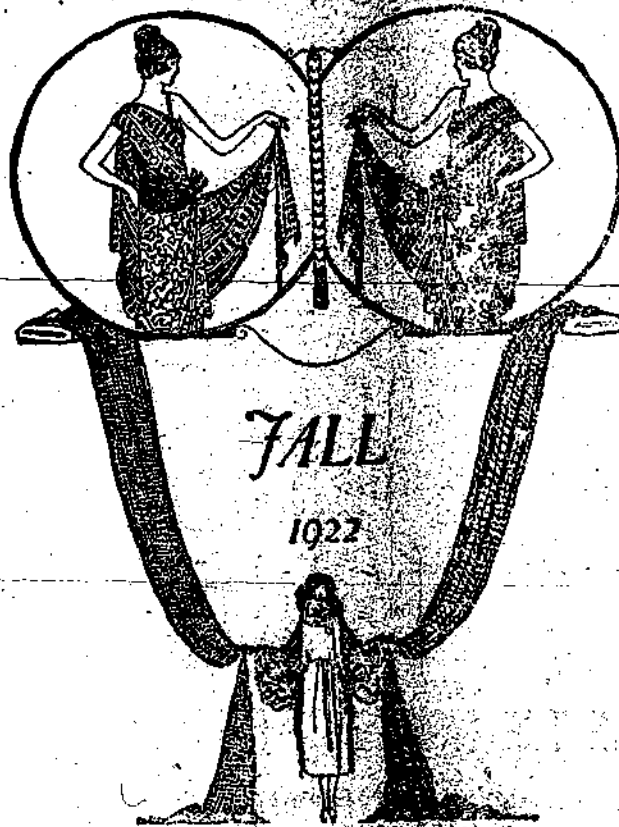

### ATTACK EDWARDS ON COAL FAILURE

Crisis Transcends All Political Questions, Frelinghuysen Declares.

#### FOUR COMMENTS SENATOR

Senator Frelinghuysen's Career as an Associate of Radicals Exposed—Record Challenged to State Whether He Will Support Regular Nominees.

ATLANTIC COUNTY, N. J.—With both the house and senate bills disposed of in the senate, Senator Frelinghuysen for the first time turned aside last week from the daily grind of his official duties to write a blow in his own campaign for re-election at the Republican primaries. With characteristic aggressiveness he launched a vigorous attack at a meeting at Ocean Grove September 7 on the do-nothing policy of the state administration in the coal crisis, declaring the question transcended all political questions, and called on Governor Edwards to take immediate steps to avert the crisis.

The example of Governor Miller of New York in his handling of the coal situation in that state was commended to Governor Edwards by the senator.

"If Governor Edwards is honestly as anxious to know what it is proper for him to do in the emergency," said the senator, "there is an example that he may profitably follow. If the pressure of duties connected with the conduct of his campaign has been so great that he has not had time to acquaint himself with the law recently passed by the extraordinary session of the New York State Legislature, I hereby offer him a digest of its salient points."

Frelinghuysen foresaw a crisis. That the present coal crisis would have been averted had legislation proposed by Senator Frelinghuysen more than a year ago been adopted, was the contention of Franklin W. Fort, of Newark, in a statement just issued. Mr. Fort described the senator's activities in the matter of coal legislation, beginning with his introduction of a resolution on October 1, 1919, calling for an investigation into the causes for the then existing high prices of coal.

As a result of this inquiry Senator Frelinghuysen introduced two bills, the first providing for a reduction in railroad freight rates on coal during the summer months, which would tend to discourage buying of coal in those months and hence practically continuous production of the mines. The second aimed at the miners' work, it was declared, has been the most fruitful cause of strikes in the mines.

The second bill provided for the creation of a Federal Commission to make an exhaustive investigation of all sides of the coal industry. Practically the identical provisions of this bill are contained in the measure just passed by the Senate.

"If the information which the adoption of this bill would have secured had been available to the government, the present crisis could not have lasted two months. If, instead, it would have been begun," Mr. Fort declared, "200,000 tons added to the country by the Senator Frelinghuysen's campaign manager, in which he evoked the career of Anna Plimpton, of New York, who has been maintaining for George E. Record and violently assaulting Senator Frelinghuysen, Congressional leaders showed that Mr. Plimpton, who inventor of many millions, during the past ten years had been closely identified with the most active radical elements in the country and had been associated with radicals who have been arrested for activities inimical to the welfare of the United States Government."

As proving Mr. Plimpton's forfeiture of any right to a title of Republicanism, Congressman Patterson recalled Plimpton's leadership with Mr. Record in 1919 in the formation of the Committee of Party Fight which repudiated the nomination of Mr. Harding and called a convention in July, 1920, for the formation of a third party.

Advantages All to Frelinghuysen in the Final Week Before the Primaries.

#### GAINS NEW SUPPORTERS

President Hibben of Princeton Thomas A. Edison issued strong statements advocating Senator Frelinghuysen's re-election—Record's Fugacity is Attacked.

#### Remember the Primaries Are September 26th

"Republican voters owe a duty to themselves and to their state on next Tuesday," says Congressman Frank F. Patterson, Jr., campaign manager for Senator Frelinghuysen in a last word statement, prior to the primaries on the 26th of this month. That is to vote without fail in the primaries for Senator Frelinghuysen and his progressive and constructive policies against the radical and destructive appeals to prejudice which are the political capital of his opponent, George L. Record. "Mr. Record is not a Republican. During his political career he has been a Democrat, a Republican, a Progressive, a Bull Moose, a member of the New Idea party, and one of the founders of the Committee of Forty-eight. He formally left the Republican party when President Harding was nominated and the only intimation that Republicans of New Jersey had that he had returned to it was when he announced his candidacy for nomination to the United States senate."

The final week before the primaries found the fight for the Republican nomination for United States senator intensified with daily additions to the strength of the incumbent, Senator Frelinghuysen, as George L. Record's candidacy paled out.

Mr. Record, although continuing to fire broadsides of questions at his opponent, maintained an admirable silence on the question asked him by Edgar A. Knapp, of Elizabeth, several weeks ago. Mr. Knapp, who is well known in the Republican party and who was for many years a leader in the Progressive wing of the party in New Jersey, in a letter to Mr. Record recently put this question to him: "If Senator Frelinghuysen wins the nomination at the forthcoming Republican primaries for the United States senate, will you abide by the choice of the people as expressed and support him for re-election?"

Up to date Mr. Record had made no reply to this letter and had not even acknowledged its receipt. Commenting on Mr. Record's silence, Mr. Knapp in a statement said:

Record's Silence Interpreted  
"Mr. Record's silence can have but one meaning, and that is that he will not support the nominee of the Republican party for United States senatorship unless that nominee happens to be himself. It apparently is justification for the many doubts that have been cast on Mr. Record's title to Republicanism which have arisen in the course of his variegated political career—a career that has caused him some half dozen times to unsuccessfully seek election at the hands of New Jersey voters under three party emblems."

As the campaign waxed, additions to the ranks of Frelinghuysen supporters were reported daily, the most distinguished of whom were Dr. David Order Hibben, president of Princeton University, and Thomas A. Edison. Mr. Edison, who had expressed a desire some time ago to make an expression that would evidence his approval as a citizen of New Jersey for the course which Senator Frelinghuysen has pursued in the senate, wrote briefly and to the point. His statement follows:

"I believe it to be to the best interests of all the people in New Jersey to have Joseph S. Frelinghuysen returned to the senate."

Dr. Hibben's statement advocating the nomination of Senator Frelinghuysen characterized him as a "Representative who has proven his unimpaired integrity and devotion to the highest welfare of our country."

"I am very glad to state my opinion concerning the claims of Senator Frelinghuysen upon the people of New Jersey for reelection to the United States Senate. During the most trying period of our history he has proved, in his official capacity as representative of the State of New Jersey, his unswerving integrity and devotion to the highest welfare of our country."

"While we are still confronted by the serious and growing evil of the war and the after-war conditions, a man of Senator Frelinghuysen's ability, character and patriotic devotion should be retained as a member of the United States Senate."

"I have heard that some of the Republican leaders in the state have rather complained that Senator Frelinghuysen has not given as much time and attention to his own candidacy in New Jersey as they would have wished."
