Educational Sunday.

To Pastors, Teachers and Officers of Boards of Education:

Commissioner of Education John Enright has designated October 8th, as Educational Sunday. This splendid idea was established in this state by Commissioner Kendal a number of years ago. No community has a greater responsibility than the proper education of its children. It is a subject upon which too much emphasis cannot be placed. Commissioner Enright in his letter to County Superintendents quotes Lincoln as follows: "Public sentiment is everything. With public sentiment nothing can fail; without it nothing can succeed." He further says:

"All forces—home, church and state—are acting together in these days to secure the best in education.

More and more we are coming to know that through education the happiness of a people may be promoted. More and more we are coming to believe that the community or the state which gives the greatest attention to the promotion of education is the best governed. Around the schools should center the best thought of any community, and in them should be taught the finest ideals of citizenship. The enlightened intelligence of any community finds its index in its schools.

Because of these facts, pastors of churches again are requested to aid in moulding public sentiment in behalf of the schools by impressing upon their congregations the great importance of education, and by urging that the standards of morality and patriotism in the schools be raised."

May I therefore most earnestly solicit you to enter into the spirit of the occasion and use what means you have to impress upon the community the value of having the home, the church and the school ever doing its best for the child.

Town Council.

Council held its session as usual on Wednesday morning, with all present but Peter Tell.

Highway Committee reported that they had employed Mr. Janette to underpin the curbs on Third Street where the road was cut down below the bottom of the curb.

Same committee was instructed to secure plans from Engineer for efficient drainage at Fourth Street, also at Third and Maple.

Among the bills ordered was one from the State Highway Department office for a list of 400 names of auto owners, at three cents each for use by the assessors.

According to the law, where those who have not installed water and sewerage along streets to be paved, the town will do it and charge the property owner for the same.

Water Department was advised to proceed with connections when time limit has expired, and where possible, the one ditch will be used for both water and sewer pipes.

Petition was presented, asking for better drainage at Third and Fairview, the crown of the road being higher than the sidewalk or private properties. Committee will investigate.

Civic Club called attention to the practice of displaying produce, wire, etc., along sidewalk and curbs on Bellevue Avenue. As it is contrary to ordinance, committee was given power to act.

N. Bruno & Son asked for permit to add another story to their garage of brick.

As to Ornull's application for transfer of Tell pool-room license to himself, to be located in two buildings, it was decided that two licenses were required, at twenty-five dollars each.

Water extension ordinance was passed second and third readings.

Some action was taken with deputy clerk ordinance.

Deputy's term will cover from Oct. and 1922, to Dec. 31st, 1923.

Mrs. Clara W. Spely was nominated, balloted for, and declared elected as deputy town clerk, with hours from nine to twelve, and two to four, Saturdays excepted.

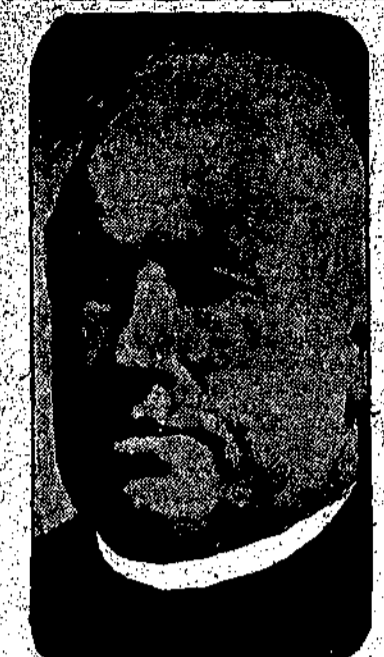

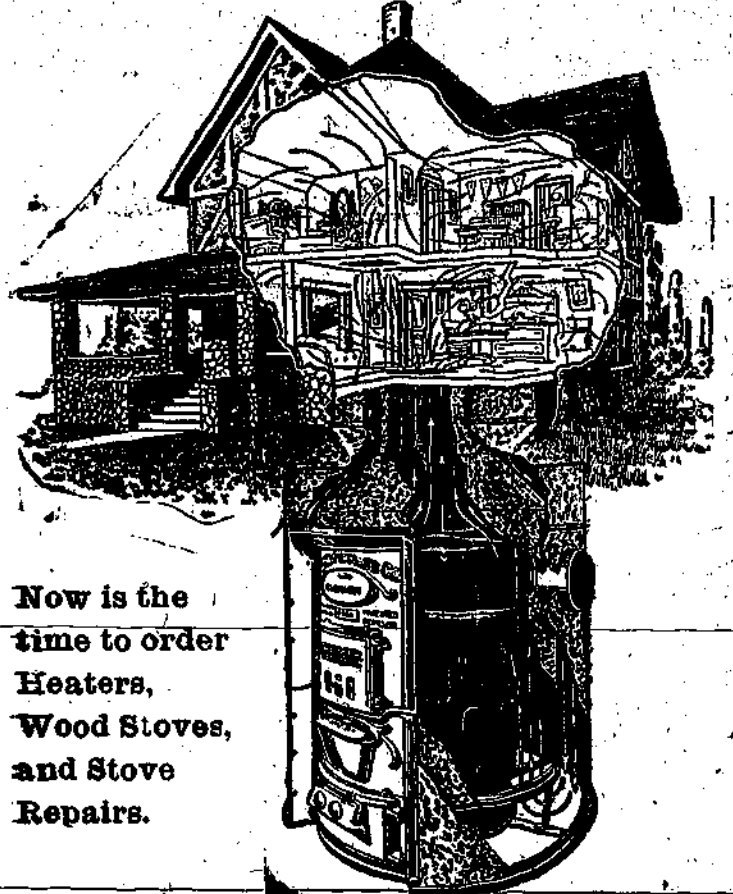

Primary Election Surprises Primary Election Day brought a full stock of surprises, for one side or the other. For instance, Frelinghuysen beat his opponent, Record, for U. S. Senate, two to one, about 75,000 majority.

White, for State Senate, was defeated by Richards by 6000. Of course, Runyon, for Governor, and Bacharach, Congressman, got through with flying colors. Less than one-half a vote was cast in Hamonton, but 1104 out of 2489. There were 1102 Republican and 92 Democratic ballots. Abbott came off with 812. Record received 500 votes, and Frelinghuysen 415. Runyon, 862; Bacharach 830; Richards 622; and White 320; Blair 300; Corio 267; Colantrillo, no opposition, 810.

For Town Council, Macri, 669; Lucas, 649; Tell, 576; Jackson, 332; Lucas, Macri and White were nominated on the Democratic ticket. Barnhouse received 732 votes to Wescoat's 183, for Overseer of Highways.

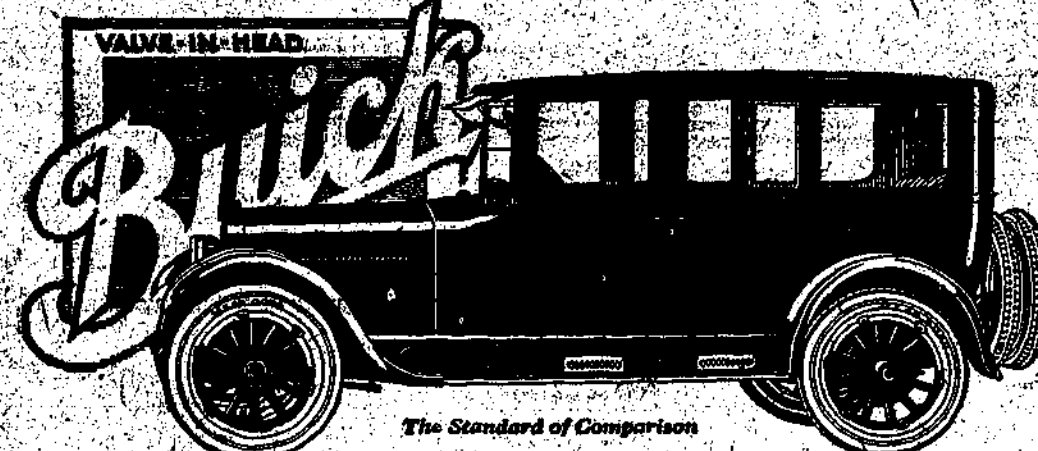

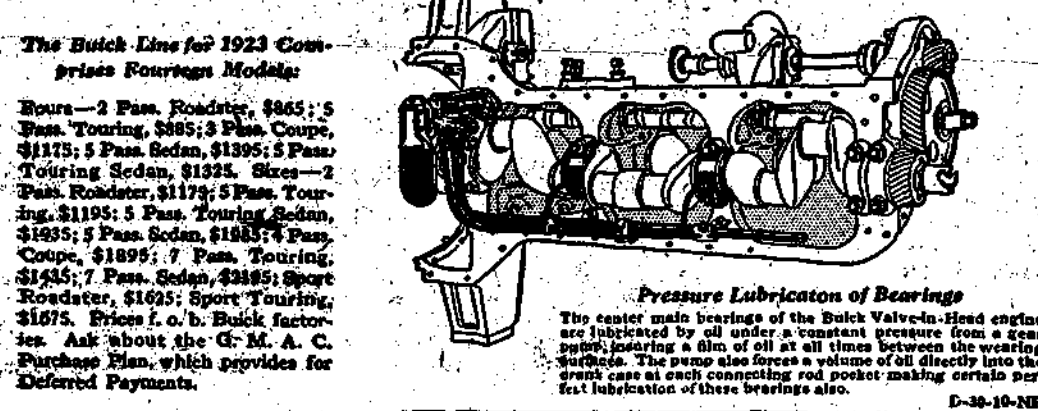
