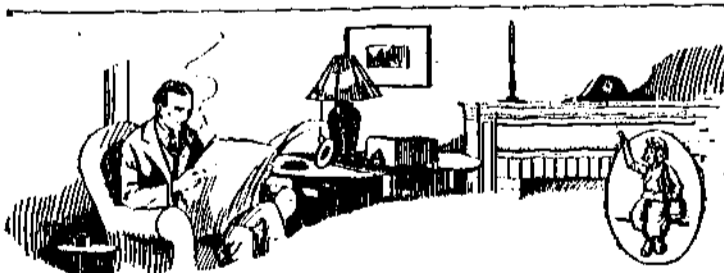

### ORDINANCE NO. 13

The ordinance providing for the licensing and regulating of auto business commonly called "license" for hire, and the classification, prescribing terms, conditions and regulations, and for the revocation of such license and chauffeur licenses.

The Township Committee of the Township of Bunn Vista, in the County of Atlantic, and State of New Jersey, do hereby enact the following ordinance, to-wit:

Section 1. Any automobile motor bus or auto truck, commonly called "license" for hire, which is used for the purpose of carrying passengers for hire, shall be licensed as follows:

Section 2. The license fee for such license shall be as follows: Class A—Single fare license, \$1.00; Class B—Double fare license, \$2.00; Class C—Chauffeur license, \$3.00.

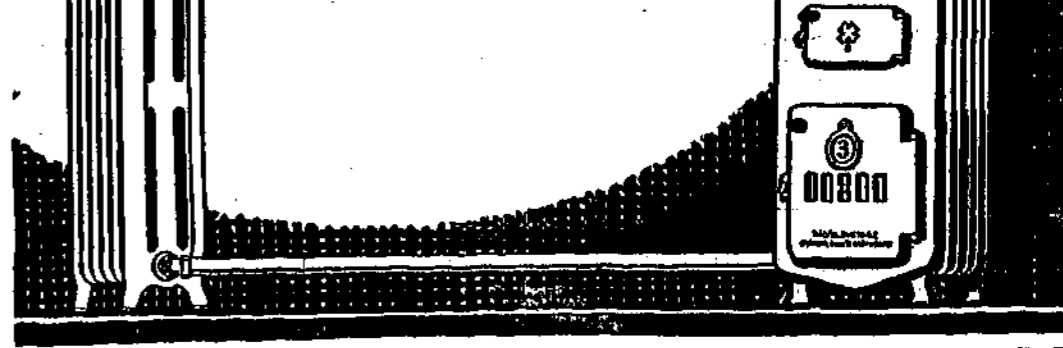

My dear Mr. Editor:
