Lyceum Course.

The first number of the Lyceum Course will be given in Victor Hall on Friday evening, at 8.15, when The Lillian Johnston Company will entertain us with Southern and Colonial songs, presented in special costumes, also with impersonations and instrumental music, making a varied program sure to please.

Season tickets are on sale at \$2.50 for adults, and \$1.50 for juniors, under 15 years of age; single admissions, 50 cents each.

These season tickets entitle the holder of same to a reserved seat, which may be obtained at Hearing's office on Monday, October 10th, at 8.00 a. m., or any time thereafter.

Booklets, describing the course of entertainments have been distributed. If any one was missed, it was because they were new to the town or their previous interest in Lyceum work had not been indicated.

This course is warranted to be of the best of Lyceum entertainments and therefore expensive. Upon its support given it depends whether the present management ever gives another one. If the full support of 300 adult tickets fails, why the guarantor has the bill to pay for it and that ends it.

Some people of Hammonton are always ready to buy tickets for a Lyceum course or for Chautauqua, while others who could and should do so have to be dogged to buy tickets. In many towns, no larger than Hammonton, there is a waiting list of people who always take tickets upon delivery for Lyceum or for Chautauqua.

Why Hammonton can not do this is not very clear to the writer, as these are the only two things of the kind given in Hammonton. Why selling tickets for a good community project has to be made such a hard task instead of an easy one, is not very clear either.

Why there are not 150 families in Hammonton ready to buy two tickets at a cost of \$5.00 for a \$7.50 Lyceum course, is a problem worthy of our study. Whither are we drifting? Could our town be called a jazz town? I leave it to you.

Why do some people make excuses when one is trying to do them a favor by bringing them a ticket of this kind? Why not buy a ticket and get the worth of your money, support the community and be a good sport.

In all this there is no malice, but simply a plain statement of facts. The truth is that it takes dogged persistence, chiding of some people, and incredible labor, listening to excuses, and heavenly patience to put over a big Lyceum course or a Chautauqua in Hammonton. Why?

The National Board of Underwriters has issued the following list of "Don'ts" for the public to consider on Fire Prevention Day, October 9th.

- 1. Don't use make-shifts instead of proper fuses in your electrical circuits; the fuse is the safety valve of the system.
2. Don't leave electric flat irons or other heating devices "turned on" while attending to something else.
3. Don't look for a gas leak with an open flame light; you will be sure to find it.
4. Don't throw your matches or lighted smoking material where they can possibly cause fire.
5. Don't smoke in bed; even if those guilty of this practice are too green to burn, the beds are not.
6. Don't let children play with matches or bon-fires.
7. Don't fail to have your defective chimneys and flues mended. They cause numerous fires in Hammonton.
8. Don't forget to have your smoke pipe cleaned of soot; if clogged, it may overheat and start a fire when you operate the furnace.
9. Don't neglect to protect walls, ceilings and partitions from the overheating of stoves, furnaces and pipes.
10. Don't put hot ashes into wooden boxes or barrels.
11. Don't fill oil lamps or stoves by open flame light; many fires have been lost by this form of carelessness.
12. Don't let rubbish accumulate; cleanliness and fire safety go hand in hand.
13. Don't fail to keep a bucket of water and a bucket of sand in a convenient place for use in case of fire; they may save the lives of your family.
14. I am taking this occasion to reach the people of Hammonton through the columns of your valuable paper, but let us hope that instead of one day in the year that they will make every day Fire Prevention Day.
15. At this time of the year when fires are about to be started to heat our houses, it is of the utmost importance that chimneys and smoke pipes be cleaned. It is especially urgent if you burn wood. More fires in Hammonton are due to neglect of this than to any other cause.

in the United States is over \$500,000,000 more than any other year except 1906 when the San Francisco catastrophe occurred. Such a destruction of our material wealth can not continue without disastrous results to our economic future. Let us do our part to cut down this enormous waste.

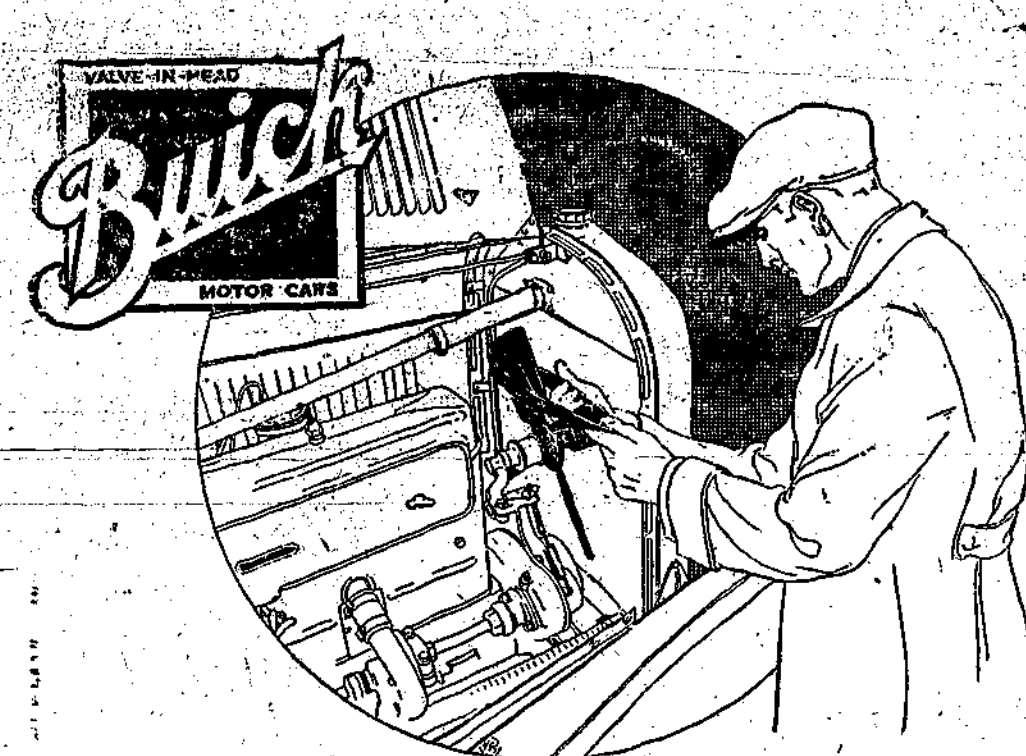

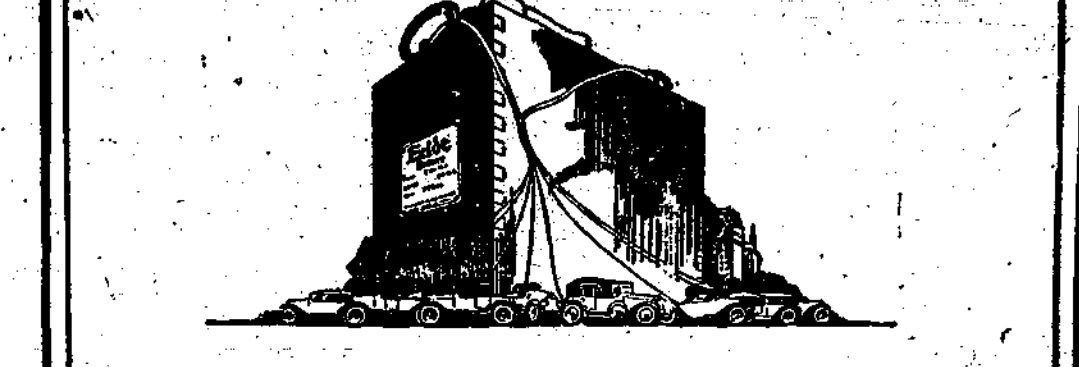

An Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE FIXING THE NUMBER OF ASSESSORS OF TAXES TO BE APPOINTED AND THE SALARY AND COMPENSATION OF SUCH ASSESSORS.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Hammonton:

1. That the number of assessors of taxes in and for the Town of Hammonton be and the same hereby is fixed at three.
2. That the salary or compensation to be paid to each of the assessors be fixed at the sum of Two Hundred Dollars per annum, and that the clerk of said assessors shall receive for such service the additional sum of Three Hundred Dollars per annum.
3. That in addition to the usual duties of the said Clerk, he shall sit in the office of the Collector of Taxes for a period of five weeks from the date of the mailing of Tax Bills for the hearing of complaints that may be made.
4. That an ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Fixing the Number of Assessors of Taxes to be appointed and the salary and compensation of such Assessors" passed March eighth, 1916, be and the same is hereby repealed.
5. That the provisions of this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
