Judge Byrnes planned for the first services of the Episcopal Church, in the old school house at the Lake, where Dr. Odenheimer (afterward the Bishop) took charge of the services, and later took official steps to organize the Church in Hammonton, and he was the first to call a meeting of all interested in forming a parish, to assemble at his house.

He was our first tressurer, and a ves tryman until within a few years of his death, always took an active part in all things pertaining to the Church's welfare, both spiritual and financial, and gave freely both of his time and money. He took a prominent part in laying the corner-stone of the Church, in 1670, and when the church was consecrated Judge Byrnes was appointed by the Bishop to stand in the chancel with the deeds and other 'papers relating to the Parish, and at the proper time hand them to the Bishop of the Diocese.

His bouse was always open to the clergy, and a warm welcome awaited GEO. F. NICHOLSON, them all.


