Five members constituted the session on Wednesday morning.

Highway Committee reported the dumping (or incinerating) plant, on Twelfth Street, as ready for business.

An hour's discussion followed, between Council, Contractor Staub and Engineer Remington's assistant, Mr. DeFny, in regard to the use of a substitute reinforcement. No conclusion was arrived at.

GIRL SAILOR QUILTS THE SEA

Sixteen-Year-Old Lass Spent Sixteen Years of Her Life on the Ocean.

When, Garbed as a Boy, She Sailed Before the Mast—Now at Home With Mother.

Los Angeles—Sixteen years out of her sixteen, Helen Lowell, now of this city, passed on board a sailing vessel. Her address was simply the Minto E. Cain, sailing between Fages Sound, Wash., and Australia and the South Sea Islands.

She was the youngest of eight children. Her father, captain of the Minto E. Cain, met with reverses just before Helen's birth that left the family in a precarious financial situation.

When three months old, Helen was carried on board the Minto E. Cain in a blanket—the sailor's way of carrying a baby on the journey that was, to last for 18 years so far as Helen was concerned.

Her father gave her a pocket watch, and she was to be a sailor's daughter. He was rigidly unrelenting about "womanly fancies."
