Council met on Wednesday evening, all members being present. About \$1100 worth of bills were ordered paid.

Rev. Charles W. Coit, rector of St. Mark's Protestant Episcopal Church, delivered a fine address. Rev. B. A. Rook, pastor of the Baptist Church, Rev. G. W. Keifer, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church and Rev. C. O. Mudge, pastor of the church where the service was held, assisted in the service. The decorations of flags and flowers by the Daughters of the American Revolution were most tasteful and effective.

The musical numbers by the large union chorus choir under the leadership of William Galpin, and the solo by Mrs. Elsie Rider Suthers, were most appropriate and well rendered. With the inspiring Litany they added much to the effectiveness of the service. The American Legion and other patriotic orders were represented by their officers and members. The offering for the foreign work of the Red Cross amounted to more than forty-five dollars. The whole service was very impressive, and most appropriate to the occasion. Those in charge deserve much credit and praise for the remarkable successful completion of their endeavors. This was made possible by the hearty co-operation of every one.
