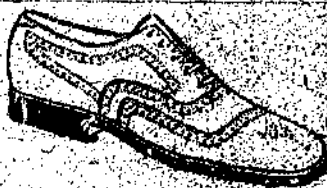

Good Roads Assured.

In reply to many inquiries, we would say that the latest reports received by the Good Roads Association of New Jersey indicate that the \$40,000,000 good roads bond bill passed by more than 20,000 majority. The action of the people in endorsing the referendum for the construction of highways and bridges brings New Jersey back to her proud position as the Mother of Good Roads, according to the officers of the association.

It was pointed out that the State is now in a more advantageous position than any other State in the Union for carrying out its highway program, without imposing additional taxes. The good roads plan, which is advocated by the Association, calls for the completion, within the next five years, of the State Highway System, including bridges, to take care of modern traffic conditions; all township and county roads brought up to travelable condition; a State Patrol System established, to maintain all roads at a high standard from the money derived from automobile licenses, all to be carried out with the means of the State now available.

Both parties represented in the incoming administration now have an opportunity to make a record by seeing that the programme is carried through to a successful conclusion.

The Good Roads Association, with its advisory committee of representatives of more than thirty of the leading commercial and civic organizations throughout the State, will be continuing its permanent organization, working for the carrying out of their complete programme, and it is safe to say that one of its chief duties will be to carry out its pledge to see that a dollar's worth of service is rendered for every dollar expended. Good roads and bridges within the next five years, and that without a penny of additional taxation, is now an assured fact. It is probable that a banquet of the Association will be held shortly, when details of the complete highway program will be outlined.

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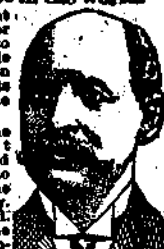
