Polling South Jersey

The selection of Hammonton as the headquarters for one of the three main stations of the New Jersey State Police who go on duty today—the others being at New Egypt and Netcong—could hardly be improved upon. Situated midway between Camden and Atlantic City, on the White Horse Pike, a trunk highway whose branches give access to all South Jersey, the force will have a mobility essential to the policing of so wide an expanse of rural territory.

In addition to this central post, at least two of the eight sub-stations which will be scattered through the State will be placed in this district at some such points as Cape May Court House and the Bridgeton-Millville region. Operating from such strategic centers and equipped with horses, motorcycles and speedy automobiles, the new body, composed of picked men who have survived a rigorous course of training, promise to be as effective a factor in the suppression of lawlessness and crime as the State Constabulary of Pennsylvania, upon which it has been modeled. 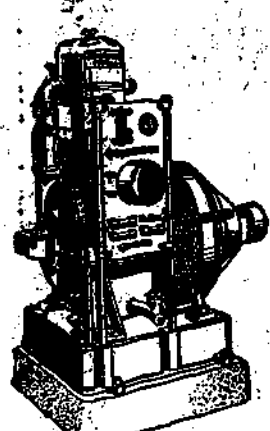

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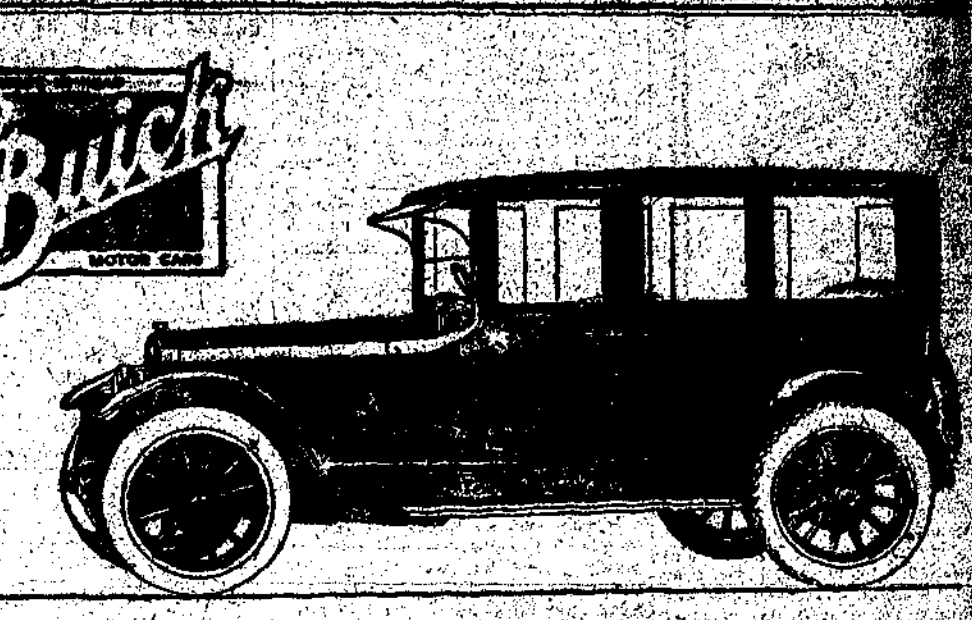
