Proposals for Collection and Removal of Garbage.

Sealed Bids or Proposals endorsed "Proposals for collection, and removal of garbage within certain limits of the Town of Hammonton," with the name or names of the person or persons making the bid, will be received by the Town Council, at the Council-room on December 27th, 1922, at eight o'clock p. m., during a session of said Council.

The work to be done under the above title, by which bids will be tested, is the collecting, carting and removal of all garbage (ashes not included) for the year 1923; three times a week during the month of July and first two weeks of August; daily (except Sunday) last two weeks of August and first two weeks of September; twice a week during the months of April, May, June, latter half of September, and month of October; once a week during November, December, January, February and March.

Garbage District to be bounded as follows:

Tratt Street to Maple Street, Fourth Street to Valley Avenue to Grand Street, including both sides of boundary lines.

All garbage to be removed in watertight, covered wagons or carts.

Contractor will be required to furnish a bond satisfactory to the Town Council in the amount of \$500 for the faithful performance of his contract and duties hereunder. Name of proposed contractor or bondsmen should accompany bid.

Bids must state where bidders would dispose of all garbage collected.

The Town Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids if it shall deem it for the public interest to do so.

All bids should be addressed to W. R. Seely, Town Clerk, plainly marked "Proposal for collection and removal of garbage within certain limits of the Town of Hammonton," and the name of the bidder.

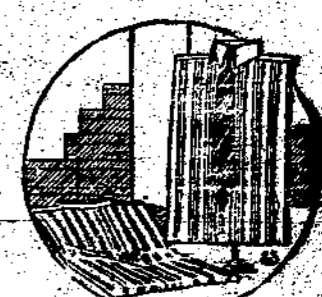

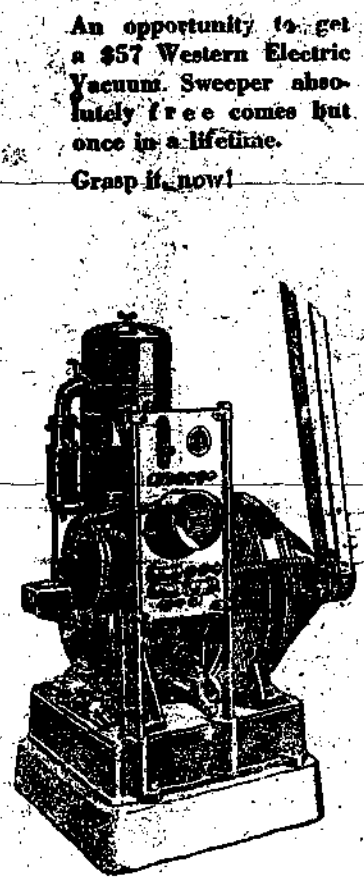

A Flax in East Accidents to School Children by Automobiles.

Little over a week ago a little six-year-old girl, an only child at home, and the darling of her parents, was snatched out of this world, through no fault of her own and no negligence of theirs. The child went to school that morning with a smiling, happy face, her head full of school work. At night she came back to a broken-hearted home.

Who is going to be the next innocent victim? Those home-going to be blasted next? Do you want your family happiness blighted by the death of a dear little one, in the same way? Every man and woman will emphatically reply NO! All of us want to send our children to school; sons of us want them to return with broken limbs, or with a life crushed out of them. What can be done, so that the wide world may read this single legend after the word "Hamonton"—"The place where auto accidents to school children are unknown."

It should not be treason to suggest the following program as an aid to that ideal:

- 1. The use of the local police to control traffic at the principle crossings, in the morning, at noon and after school.
2. The use of some of the high school boys, to supplement the police force for the same purpose. (They are so used, for example, in Chicago.)
3. Something done at home, or in school, or by some other agency, to encourage children to cross streets at corners only.
4. That some form of safe conduct be supplied for the children attending the outlying schools—especially those near the state highway—in the shape of transportation, or sidewalks, or escort, or anything better than these.
5. A strict enforcement of the speed laws for automobiles when going by school houses.
6. Urging drivers to drive slowly and carefully when meeting or overtaking children along the road.

In passing, it may be mentioned that the actual number of accidents do not reflect the real number of close calls to life and limb of persons.

The troop, in their travels about the camp, found an experienced wood-chopper cutting wood, and the scoutmaster requested a loan of his good sharp axe to try out the boys. He readily agreed, and upon trial, every boy showed ability to make a successful clean cut through hard wood ranging from three to five inches, while some handled like life veteran wood-choppers. The troop had a successful, happy day, and as evening, a leg weary troop and the five o'clock train all arrived at Winslow at the same time; the temptation was great, and the hike ended there. Medals for Services in Fire, Wreck and Flood



Miss Ann Murphy, of Carbonado, Pa., and Miss Keziah Weeks, of Hottelton, Pa., both operators for The Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania, with Pezelle Theodore H. Valli, Misses Stella and a card reward of \$200 each for "outstanding public service," starting 1921.

These two ladies appeared in a list of nine silver medal winners and \$10 gold medal winner announced by the trustees of the Theodore H. Valli Memorial Fund, the gold medal and \$500 going to Myron E. Tindly, a night watchman man for the Mountain States Telephone & Telegraph Company at Pueblo, Colorado.

Miss Murphy's opportunity for noteworthy service came when she was on a train leaving Hottelton. Looking out of the window she saw flames pouring from a store immediately beneath the Hottelton telephone office. Without hesitation she jumped from the moving train and after running into the railroad station and sending a telegram to the Traffic Department at Hamonton she hurried to the burning building.

She found the operating room filled with smoke. The operating circuit was playing a fire extinguisher upon the flames, so Miss Murphy took a position at the gate. She telephoned to the Hamonton telephone office and remained at the board until the smoke became so dense that she ordered the gate to be closed, following them from the building.

It was the unusual resourcefulness of Miss Weeks that revolutionized a railroad disaster at Hottelton and resulted in her being named as a silver medal winner. At 6:30 in the morning, when she was in charge of the Hottelton telephone office, Miss Weeks received a call from a train dispatcher at Philadelphia, advising her to reach the station agent at Hottelton.

As she had seriously damaged the railroad bridge over the river, the station agent at Hottelton, due to leave Hottelton in five teen minutes, was about to pass over the structure. After only trying to reach the station agent, Miss Weeks called a neighbor and asked her to send someone to the station to warn the train crew. Thus a wreck was averted.

Mr. Tindly's service was rendered in Pueblo during the flood there in June, 1921. He was only 20 years old. The evidence shows that he worked untiringly throughout the night for the comfort of the telephone operators who were stranded in the telephone building.
