I have been directed to ask your assistance in solution of the following public question which has been the subject of considerable discussion at several of our meetings, and which remains unsolved up to the present day.  
Why is our present Town Engineer Remington, who is not a resident nor taxpayer of Hammonton, annually reappointed to the position, when it has been conspicuously demonstrated that the alignment of curbing and street grading in many sections of the Town has been so haphazardly and inefficiently performed that it has required in some instances, notably on North Second Street, the complete relocating of an entire block of curbing?  
Our assessors call attention to the fact that they are continually hampered and delayed in their work of map readjustments etc., through their inability to get the proper and prompt co-operation of this engineer in matters affecting these departments of local government.  
The name of a local civil engineer, recommended by the government, fully qualified and competent to fill the position, has been submitted time and again for the approval of our governing body, and yet no favorable action has been recorded. Why? Yes, we ask why?

We, the dear citizen and taxpayers of this town are digging down in our pockets deeper and deeper every year, and paying taxes to maintain a budget that is burdened by the bungling of un-arrived public officials, and ask, "How much longer does a gullible public have to tolerate this state of affairs?"


